HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE FUTURE OF THE AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL BOTANIC GARDENS

Australians are invited to have their say on the way the Australian National Botanic Gardens will be managed over the next 10 years.

A new management plan is about to be developed for the Gardens and seeking community input is the first step.

“We welcome people with an interest and passion for the future of the Australian National Botanic Gardens to share their ideas on issues they would like to see addressed,” Gardens Director Anne Duncan said.

“We want the views of the community to help shape the vision and role of this vital institution.

“Since its beginnings, the Australian National Botanic Gardens has led the way as one of the first all-native botanic gardens, focusing on the horticulture and propagation of Australian plants.

“Over time the Gardens has evolved to focus on plant conservation, researching threatened species and restoration in the wild and establishing a seed bank.

“We would like the new plan for our national botanic gardens to reflect the changing needs of Australian society and the new challenges we face, particularly in the face of climate change.”

Comments are being sought on a range of issues including:

- the priorities for the Gardens with respect to climate change and plant conservation
- how to increase and diversify sources of revenue to support the work of the Gardens
- which plants should be maintained and displayed at the Gardens
- what activities and events motivate people to visit the Gardens and what kind of educational activities should be offered
- what kinds of botanical and horticultural science the Gardens should be involved in.

Once comments have been submitted a draft management plan will be developed and released for public input (this is expected to occur later this year). A final management plan will then be prepared.
